Sempervivum tectorum is a low-growing (4 inches), perennial succulent easily grown in full sun to partial shade. It grows best in zones 3 to 11. Its common name (which, in itself, appeals to kids) refers to the fact that the mother plants (hens) make off-shoots (chicks) that can simply be plucked off and grown somewhere else.

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
