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For Apostolopoulos, we might say, phenomenology of phenomenology must turn into phenomenology of language. The second part of Apostolopoulos' twofold contribution ramifies this point about language as transcendental condition, through the simple, repeated, and emphatic insight that (1) phenomenology is a descriptive project, and (2) description happens in language.
